
The story of Vogue editor Audrey Withers, from the Blitz to the Swinging Sixties.

On 25 September 1940, three weeks into the German Blitz on London, 35-year old Audrey Withers stepped into the shoes of her American predecessor as editor of London Vogue. Described during the war by the President of the Board of Trade as the most powerful woman in London, Audrey Withers, kept the magazine going in the toughest of circumstances. The first editions under her role as editor were put together in a bomb cellar in New Bond Street as she strove to bring out the magazine amid the ruins of the capital. As the war progressed, so Audrey's influence over the fate of Vogue grew, drawing it inexorably away from the style and preoccupations of the mothership in New York. Audrey needed her readers to believe that London Vogue had its finger on the pulse of



FROM UP NATELY

There is no news from Up Nately apart from knowing several residents have offered a safe haven to any Ukrainian refugees, which reminded me of the aftermath of the massive storm on 1st February 1953, I was a little girl living in the Netherlands between The Hague and Scheveningen.

The result was that huge areas in the very Southern islands of the country, Zeeland, were completely flooded by the sea with people sitting on their roofs trying to escape drowning, it has left a huge impression on me, never to be forgotten. We had a 'flood refugee' staying with us for a few days, a young chap who never said a word, he must have been very traumatised and I was warned not to ask questions... I did not understand that at all.

At my school we collected relief items for flood victims and my favourite little cuddly toy roe deer was given for a Zeeland child, amazing how I have never forgotten that.

Thank goodness huge dams have been built since to stop any more disastrous flooding; if ever you drive through that area, take half a day and visit the fabulous information centre of Neeltje Jans, well worth it! It opened my eyes.

Let us make any Ukrainian refugees welcome! Liz Preece

POLICE UPDATE FROM PCSO ANDY JONES

Report of 16th March

There has been a spike in metal theft in Basingstoke town and rural areas recently. Due to eagle-eyed members of the public a photo was obtained of the individual as well as the registration of the silver van used. The suspect was quickly identified and a marker placed on his vehicle to stop and progress.

Thames Valley police have intercepted the suspect and charged with disqualified driving which is something we were also able to confirm. Unfortunately TVP have not dealt with the thefts in question but we are aware that the individual will be attending a court on a date and time in question.

He will be dealt with for additional offences in the near future – including the theft of a radiator from Cliddesden and bolts removed from a metal fencing surrounding a property in Brown Candover. (It's believed the intention was to steal the supporting metal posts – fortunately these were concreted in.)

A report was received of a theft of a car which had been delivered from an agent selling the vehicle to a property in Brown Candover (cost of £47,425). The car has now been insured in Scotland and so followed up by another force.

At approximately 1400 hours on Saturday 5th March, police were called to Herriard with reports of trespassers on a property. Hunting saboteurs were getting in the way of the organised hunt, disrupting activities of those on the land and intimidating persons by filming them and being verbally aggressive – which ended with some pushing of persons in the process.

On 20th February a report was received of Criminal Damage caused to a wing mirror of a car. The mirror appeared to have been kicked off completely and required a full replacement.

On 12th February police received a report of Hare Coursing in Bradley. The land owner the next morning noticed tyre tracks over the land – no lines of enquiry.

Public Access Defibrillators (PADs) As supported by the 2021 Parish Assembly (held online) the Parish Council has purchased two x Public Access Defibrillators (PADs) now installed, with kind permission, at both pubs. The Parish Council received grant funding with thanks to the Clubroom, County Cllr Elaine Still and Ward Councillors. Thanks also to the Pubs for organising installation and wiring for the cabinets.

Defibrillator demonstration To thank Nick and Penny from Hartley Wintney Fire Station for demonstrations on using a defibrillator and the importance of both early intervention and dialling 999 without delay. The Iron Bull hosted two sessions – with coffee – for total of 48 people – the majority being Water End Park residents, but also from the Andwell Brewery Cafe and Hackwood Business Park.

Newnham Green working party of 9th December with Parish Lengthsman plus Volunteer group from Schréder organised via B/stoke Voluntary Action. To record thanks to all the Schréder volunteers who worked incredibly hard. Lengthsman cleared sections of ditch with digger. Plus mowed and scarified Triangle by main pond. Work by hand included – ditch clearing; ditch banks opposite pub planted foxglove and cowslip plugs; arisings from Triangle raked and removed; wildflower plugs planted (thanks to Hatch Warren Nature Group for donating); main pond

margins cleared; pond by crossroads

bluebell and snowdrop bulbs planted

between Crown Lane and Church Path;

c60% Willow saplings removed;

weed shrubs and saplings cleared.

Official beacon-lighting is the Thursday evening (beacons lit 9.45pm) and the 'Jubilee lunch' promoted for Sunday.

Discussion – A Thursday evening event makes sense if people may go away for the weekend. Gas beacon not value for money and arguably not in tune with climate and energy crisis. Consider alternatives. Ideal to have the pub involved. Chairman to discuss options, Clerk to look to grant funding.

Jubilee Tree – Queen's Green canopy. The Parish Council would like to plant trees – need agreement as to location(s). Recently lost a lot of big trees around and in the Parish.

Litter and debris by A30 from Water End and through Nately Scures has increased significantly. BDBC Street Cleansing Manager 'will assess the route this week and arrange for any litter picking to be done asap'.

Newnham litter pick Sunday 20th March – part of the national Keep Britain Tidy Great British Spring Clean 2022. Thanks to Alan Richmond for organising and to all who took part.

Bus shelters Lengthman to clean and maintenance check.

Parish Lengthsman funding from HCC confirmed for 2022/23.

Clubroom update Committee comprises Chris Alliston, Alastair Jeffries, Rosemary Richardson and Leah Stenning. All Covid restrictions lifted, only limit is the insurance maximum capacity of the Hall which is 60. Unfortunately again a prohibition on hire for teenage parties due to a problem incident when a party was gate-crashed. The Clubroom has Solar plus battery storage, and Wi-fi. CCTV also installed; recently the window double glazing units have been replaced.

The Greening Campaign requires the support of the Parish Council to sign up – but needs the community to lead on and engage with. Idea being that big differences are achieved by multiple small actions. The Expert Advice packages – as funded by HCC – are available immediately.

Road surface repairs A30 recently closed from Water End towards Scures Hill for four nights, repairing cracks in the road both carriageways.

Road signage by the Clubroom traffic calming buildout has been renewed and rationalised under the Community -funded initiative; plus cats eyes and repainted white lines. The posts have been painted white with a rail added to make the buildout more visible, traffic cones removed.

Police message – again and again – is that all local policing is intelligence led. Vital for the public to report any suspicious activity. Noted that Newnham presently not well-positioned in terms of Policing Areas, being between the Candovers, Hart and Basingstoke (officially part of Basingstoke East) and not having a dedicated rural officer.

NEWNHAM PONDS

The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Amphibian and Reptile Group have been working to remove some of the growth of the non-native New Zealand Pygmyweed (*Crassula helmsii*)) over the last couple of years. This is aimed at controlling the growth of this invasive plant and to increase the open water for the protected Great Crested newt.

Last year we trialled the removal of turves of the *Crassula* along a 30m section and made follow up visits to a 15m section to remove all new shoots. So far this seems to be a success and we hope to hit the *Crassula* harder at the end of this year. There are two factors limiting the work we can do; the legal protection of the Great Crested newts mean that we can only work in the water when the newts are not present (although we could apply for a licence, this would be more onerous for a volunteer group) and we need to follow set protocols for removing the *Crassula* which is a prohibited plant under the Wildlife and Countryside Act.

As to the Great Crested newt population, we have seen the population grow from an average peak count of 30-40 adults in 2019/20 to 50-80 adults so far this year. The peak counts are only the adults we see at a given time and only for about 70% of the bank which means we are looking at over 100 breeding adults if we carry that figure across for the whole bank. A peak count of 100+ Great Crested newts is considered to be an 'exceptional' population. We are hoping to survey more ponds in the area and I would be keen to hear from residents in the Village and surrounding area if they would allow me to visit after dark to shine a torch in their ponds or waterbodies.

This would allow us to consider the wider population, called a metapopulation, and could possible open up new possibilities for the Parish Council if we can prove a wider exceptional metapopulation. Please email me on petewest@hotmail.com if you would consider allowing me to survey your pond over the coming weeks.

FROM THE MINISTRY TEAM

As I write this, it is Day 16 of the invasion of Ukraine. Daily we see more

and more distressing images of bombed hospitals, people displaced from their homes, children and adults brutally killed and injured, and already more than two million Ukrainian refugees fleeing the country to Poland and other European countries.

As we look on, it is easy to feel helpless and powerless in the face of such suffering. However, there is one thing we can all do, and that is to pray.

But how might we pray? One of the most well-known prayers in the world, the Lord's Prayer, was taught by Jesus to his followers in the first century, and it's recorded in the Bible in Matthew's gospel:

Our Father in heaven,
Hallowed be your name,
Your kingdom come,
Your will be done,
On earth as it is in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins, As we forgive
those who sin against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from the evil one.

One of the most striking phrases, which is often overlooked, is this: 'Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.'

Jesus, the Son of God, included this potent request so that we might ask for something better on earth. And it also raises the question that is often asked: 'Where is God in the midst of all this suffering?' A question that many are asking at the moment.

A recent initiative has been launched called 'Try Praying' (trypraying.co.uk), and the booklet they have produced helpfully explores this question of suffering like this:

'The phrase "Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven" turns on its head a common misunderstanding. When things go wrong people blame God. When suffering occurs people often think it is God's will. But what Jesus said kicks that into touch. It says God's will is often NOT being done! It's a mess and God is not happy with it. Bad stuff happens – really bad stuff.

'This kind of language makes us realise things are not right. We live on a beautiful planet, but there are serious problems. It is occupied by a flawed human race. At times we all do appalling things that bring suffering to others. In addition, Jesus mentions circumstances and influences that test us and he says there is an 'evil one'. So instead of laying the blame for bad stuff at God's door we should put blame where it really belongs.

'We are invited to pray for God's kingdom to come; something which will make life on earth better. We can ask that things here would change and for God's will to be done instead. God's ultimate purposes will be fulfilled, and he will right all wrongs. Not only that, but he is not uncaring as we face suffering, he is compassionate – which he showed so powerfully by coming amongst us in the person of Jesus and dying for us on the cross.'

May I encourage us all to pray more and more? How about we all as a community commit ourselves to praying this, the Lord's Prayer, each day, as we lift up to God the people of Ukraine, and pray for peace in that land, and protection and healing for all concerned.

Please do also join us in our regular prayer vigils at All Saints' Church, Odiham – and around the 12 churches in our local network (the benefice) that we have recently started in response to this conflict. After one of these prayer vigils, someone remarked to me afterwards that they had felt in our midst a real sense of power – overcoming what they had previously felt of being powerless and helpless in the face of such suffering.
