

NOTES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MAY AGM

No Parish Council elections for Mapledurwell & Up Nately this year, Hugo Cubitt re-elected chairman.

Footpaths and tree warden (noncouncillor roles) Thanks to Martin Carfrae who continues as Footpaths Warden. The Chairman recorded the Parish Council's thanks to John Maclean for his many years as Tree Warden, and thanks to Colin Robertson for taking up the role.

Playground Thanks to Kevin Rafferty for continuing the monthly playground inspection, the annual (May) RoSPA (Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) safety inspection is due.

Accounts and audit 2022/23, forms agreed and signed, to be published on Parish Council website.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding received over the past two years provided for – in equal measure for Mapledurwell and Up Nately – tree works at the Village Hall and allotments; replacing fence and ditch crossing at Mapledurwell pond; a 20-year lease for the Frog Lane chalk stream; improving drainage and verge restoration by the allotment gates – clearing and fencing the Up Nately Green. Additional funding received this year will enable a water connection (standpipe) to the new allotment plot.

Parish & Town Council investment fund Congratulations to Tim Lewis and Village Hall Committee for achieving this Government funding – paid via County to the Parish Council – for energy efficiency improvements.

The Chairman also thanked his fellow Parish Councillors, Footpaths Warden Martin Carfrae, Colin Robertson as new Tree Warden, and the clerk, for their team effort for the community.

Crime figures In the absence of a Police representative, an online search reveals reported crime for the Parish in the 12 months to March 2023: Up Nately 1; Penny Bridge 1; Blackstocks Lane 1; The Hatch 9; Andwell 3. Showing Mapledurwell as the safest place to live in the parish!

Notes from the past year...

Following a mapping exercise for the roadside grips, the Parish Lengthsman managed to clear a good number of them on Tunworth and Greywell Roads, work to be continued as the LM scheme will continue this year.

An interesting year re planning. A significant application that did not get though was for six houses in the paddock at the north west end of Tunworth Road. Its dismissal by the Planning Inspector could be important for the protection of Mapledurwell.

Thanks to the Village Hall Committee for its many events, particularly the fantastic Jubilee party (sponsored by the Friends of St Mary's), and the recent Coronation Big Help Out 'Rubbish Event' which managed to collect over 40 bags of rubbish.

The Bonfire & Firework party was cancelled this year; to look for an alternative community event.

Village Hall Chairman Tim Lewis gave a brief update. As most know, the 'P&TC Investment fund' via HCC paid for insulation, an air con system, replacement lighting, all which should give huge energy savings. Will also look to get the kitchen changed and outside painted. Thanks to Ward Councillor grant for an LED projector.

May elections Congratulations to Onnalee Cubitt on her re-election as Ward Councillor. Onnalee is now portfolio holder for Major Projects and Regeneration, her message that it is crucial to progress with Manydown.

Issues raised by the public Speeding – a minority of drivers across the spectrum, irrespective of destination or age. Need a civil conversation about treating county lanes and all road users with respect. Also industrial scale burning at Little Tunnel Bridge. There is a waste licence in place to bring in material to burn. Advice for all to report on BDBC website re environmental health.

TALES FROM THE CHALKSTREAM

I have two new sightings to report this month. New for me at least.

First up, we had a pair of Common Whitethroats visit our garden regularly for a few days during May. Sparrow sized, the male has a grey tufted forehead, trademark white throat and chestnut coloured wings, while the female lacks the grey head and has a less bright throat. While they are a member of the usuallymelodious warbler family (chiffchaff, blackcap, etc), their song is described as scratchy with a scolding tone.



These small birds are migratory and spend their winters in Africa, Arabia and Pakistan. Their preferred habitat is open, cultivated countryside, nesting in bushes and brambles – so we have plenty of all that. While I have seen them before in the open countryside this is the first time I have seen them in the garden. That said they do belong to the LBJ category (Little Brown Job), so they can be confused at a distance for the more commonly seen dunnocks, sparrows, and the like.

Second up, I had to do a bit of research as I am no dragonfly expert, but on several occasions recently I have seen a male Beautiful Demoiselle patrol its territory over the watercourse that runs through the allotments. This is a species of damselfly which are very closely related to dragonflies; the main differences are that damselflies hold their wings closed, rather than wide open, when at rest, and their eyes sit at each side of the head rather than more centrally.

About 4-5cm long, the male Beautiful Demoiselle is metallic blue-green with striking azure blue-black wings – a truly beautiful sight. The female's wings are iridescent brown. I haven't seen her yet, but hopefully his efforts aren't in vain – they are all only just emerging from their larval stage around mid-late May.

These insects are a strong indicator of water quality. They prefer slower flowing, partially shaded, undisturbed channels which are not nutrient rich; clean pebbles or sand, no sludge or fertilisers. All of which ensures that the oxygen absorption is higher and provides ideal conditions for the female to lay her eggs on vegetation such as water mint and burr-reed, at or below water level.

BDBC Strengthening Communities Grant scheme

Open to 18 June – www.basingstoke.gov.uk/funding

Applications up to £15,000 for projects to be delivered over 12 months. CRITERIA This scheme does not fund capital costs. It is a revenue-only scheme. Expenditure such as physical improvements or changes to premises and facilities is not eligible under this scheme.

Funding can however be applied for to retain an existing staff member, recruit a new member of staff or increase working hours of existing staff where their activities are directed towards building the organisation's sustainability and/or enhancing services. Likewise, should an organisation decide to start the delivery of new services aimed at increasing income generation while addressing community needs, funding can be applied for to kick start delivery.

The Chairman June James welcomed everyone to the meeting, but then confirmed her intention to resign from the Parish Council which will be with immediate effect. June has been a Parish Councillor for 11 years and Chairman for seven. Noting she has also been a member of the Clubroom Committee (when Michael Allenby was Chairman) and then on the VCC (and managing the Oppé garden), and so has played a part in all the Parish institutions. Her message is to recognise the role of the Parish Council in giving the Parish a voice.

Paul Gaskell was elected Chairman for 2023/24 and thanked June on behalf of the Parish Council for the lead role she had played and for all she has done for the Parish, with accord and thanks from all present.

Congratulations and thanks to Pauline Hedges for all her hard work organising the Water End Coronation party, and to the Iron Bull for hosting. Thanks also to the Clubroom for the loan of the tables and chairs.

The drainage work undertaken by HCC at Water End in February was noted, along with the support and additional ditching work carried out by the Parish Lengthsman. HCC has a scheme lodged for long term drainage improvement but no date yet for implementing. It was agreed and put on record that any drainage scheme should include sedimentation devices for surface water runoff to the Lyde.

Footpath warden's report on Hook sections of Church Path and the connecting Hook footpath to Kingsbridge. 

From the Ministry Team



By the time you read this, the Coronation will probably feel like a 1,000 years ago, but as I write I can still feel the dull ache in my legs from 14 hours straight on my feet two days ago, as I had the once in a lifetime opportunity to attend the Coronation Concert in Windsor in recognition of my work with Ukrainian refugees. What an honour!

The whole weekend had lots of 'stand out' moments for me: Listening to opera singers fill the venue with their body-shaking voices; meeting other people who do such inspirational things in the community; enjoying Katy Perry live...

But, especially as the youth pastor, I think the one that possibly means the most to me was right at the beginning of the service on the Saturday, when a 14-year-old boy addressed the King: 'Your Majesty, as children of the kingdom of God we welcome you in the name of the King of kings.'

The BBC experts who were sifting through every word after the event have suggested that, in modern parlance, this might be compared to him saying 'Hi! Welcome to our home, but what are you doing here?' Charles' response was clear and to the point:

'In his name and after his example I come not to service but to serve.'

This sentiment was then re-emphasised in both William's speech at the concert and Justin Welby's sermon in The Abbey. `

We are here to crown a king, and we crown a king to serve.'

From the very beginning of his reign (and in fact, for the 50 or so years before it) Charles has recognised one of the key truths of being a good leader – understanding that your role is not to sit on a throne and receive adoration, but to kneel down, take the towel from around your waist and wash the feet of those you are called upon to lead. You will of course recognise the reference to Jesus at the last supper, and quite possibly we may never see Charles break out the warm soapy suds near our toes, but you get the idea!

Charles promised to follow Jesus' example and continue to live a life dedicated to the people who live in the UK and beyond: putting our needs before his own and speaking out against injustice against individuals, nations and even the natural world – showing a radical kind of love. To proclaim good news to the poor, to proclaim freedom for the prisoner and recovery of sight for the blind and to set the oppressed free.

Recognise those words? They're taken from one of the readings in The Coronation – Luke 4: 18 – and were read by Jesus in the synagogue at the very beginning of his ministry. Just like Charles, right at the beginning of his work, Jesus sets out his policy statement. We are to stand up for those who are weak and speak for those who have no voice. Jesus came for everyone but especially for society's rejected people, the poor, prisoners, the oppressed.

Right from the start, he stated that he wasn't going to fit in with the cultural norms. All through his ministry He went against the grain and radically

loved those that didn't deserve it. He didn't choose to associate much with the people that society would have back in the day!

Nobody ever came to Jesus and went away feeling that he had marginalised or snubbed them. He encouraged children; he was friends with tax collectors and sinners; women were among his followers; Romans were greeted; the woman taken in adultery was treated with dignity.

We too are called to take on this mantle of social concern and justice. We can't claim to follow Jesus and treat anyone with contempt. As James said, 'I will show you my faith through my works' (James 2:18).

But that's easier said than done, here in the beauty and relative affluence of the North Hampshire Downs, isn't it? I wonder who exactly we would see as the marginalised and oppressed as we walk down Odiham high street, who are those in our community who feel like outcasts and unloved as we walk across the fields in our villages?

I leave the job of thinking about that up to you, but I am convinced that they are there, and that to make a difference to our world we need to learn to love them more like Jesus would, and if that means going against the grain in who we display love to, then so be it! We need to be aware of those who may feel left out and ignored, we need to show them radical love like Jesus would and Charles has promised to.

Hi everyone!

How did you guys celebrate The King's Coronation? Did you watch it on TV? Maybe you actually went up to London? Ate cucumber sandwiches at a street party? Watched the concert?

I was incredibly honoured to be invited to go to the actual concert as a 'thank you' for my work with Ukrainian families. It was certainly a day I'll never forget! Early start, and then in the queue before midday. Glorious weather and loads of chats with random strangers in the queue (you know me!) and we finally made it to the stage. We were so close, I could literally almost reach out to touch the performers!

This is me listening to Scott Mills from Radio 2!

I wonder if you had a stand out moment during the performance? There were so many I could choose from, but I think it has to be Prince William's words about his dad (if you want to hear me ramble on about that, read my editorial opposite) and Katy Perry's

performance of *Roar*. If you want to watch it back, just scan the QR code for the BBC coverage of her act. Part of the reason I like Katy Perry is her lyrics. I wonder if you have ever really listened to the lyrics of *Roar*? Have a read of this little extract:

'I used to bite my tongue and hold my breath... Scared to rock the boat and make a mess. So I sat quietly, agreed politely...'



I wonder how many times you have just been scared to stand up


for who you are? Scared to stand up for someone who is being treated? Scared to 'rock the boat' and say you don't agree with something, just in case you get into trouble or your friends and family don't agree with you.

There are loads of places in the Bible which talk about how we should be brave and stand up for what is right. At the bottom of the page is one of them – in fact, it was the reading at the Coronation. Crack the code to find out what Jesus said...

Jesus said these words just after he came out of the wilderness. Right at the beginning of the three years he spent teaching and healing. It was all brand new for him. He was probably a bit overwhelmed by what he was expected to do. REPORTS FROM HAMPSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

Pot holes and other road defects are a big issue locally so why so many and what is being done about them. The freeze-thaw action of water when it gets into cracks can rapidly weaken and break open road surfaces, and then the hydraulic effect of vehicle tyres constantly going over standing water in cracks and other small surface defects. This is why, even though we are moving into summer, potholes are continuing to develop and why some of the temporary fixes are beginning to break down. HCC Highways team took the decision to carry out more emergency temporary infill repairs to keep roads safe and serviceable. In the region of four to seven temporary infills can be completed for one permanent repair and so 40,000 of these potholes were filled in December to February.

The Big Fix – Repair Cafe Network Residents are encouraged to give old items, gathering dust or potentially destined for the bin, a new lease of life by visiting their local Repair Café. The Big Fix is a national campaign to promote the growing number of Repair Cafés across the UK, run by volunteers who teach residents how to fix items at home so that fewer end up as waste. There are 17 members of the County Council's Hampshire Repair Café network which offers training and general advice. Since May last year, the network has collectively run over 90 events restoring over 1,000 items to usable order. These include electronics, garden equipment, clothing, jewellery, and much more. The initiative is supported through HCC's waste prevention community grant programme.

Beware ticks Ticks can cause serious illnesses such as Lyme Disease. Hampshire County Council Countryside Service advices residents to be 'tick aware' when spending time outdoors as the summer approaches. Advice includes to avoid areas of tall grass, reduce the amount of exposed skin, check yourself, your children and your pets for ticks and use insect repellent. They advise that you should remove any ticks as quickly as possible with fine-tipped tweezers or a tick removal tool, clean the area, and for several weeks monitor the bitten area for any rashes that may appear. Contact your doctor immediately if you begin to feel unwell with flu-like symptoms or develop a spreading circular red rash.
