# Information on Coronavirus (COVID-19)

The government is making regular announcements in response to the ongoing outbreak.

Current situation

The latest announcement from the government is:

You should only leave the house for one of four reasons:

- Shopping for basic necessities, for example food and medicine, which must be as infrequent as possible.
- One form of exercise a day, for example a run, walk or cycle - alone or with members of your household.
- Any medical need, or to provide care or to help a vulnerable person.
- Travelling to and from work, but only where this absolutely cannot be done from home.

These four reasons are exceptions - even when doing these activities, you should be minimizing time spent outside of the home and ensuring you are two metres apart from anyone outside of your household.




### 10 ways you can protect yourself, your loved ones and your community:

- 1. Discuss with household members, other relatives, friends and neighbours to discuss what to do if a COVID-19 outbreak occurs in your community and what the needs of each person will be.
- 2. If your neighbourhood has a website or social media page, consider joining it to maintain access to neighbours, information, and resources. Alternatively, share phone numbers and email addresses particularly with those who are isolated or vulnerable.
- 3. Consider establishing a 'buddy' system within your community to ensure everyone stays connected to COVID-19 related news, services and can receive support safely, such as essentials deliveries.
- 4. Plan ways to care for those who might be at greater risk for serious complications.
- 5. Choose a room in your home that can be used to separate sick household members from those who are healthy.
- 6. Learn how to self-isolate. Guidance can be found on the NHS website: https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/self-isolation-advice/
- 7. Create a list of local organisations that you and your neighbours can contact in the event that one of you need access to information, healthcare services, support, or resources. Consider including organisations that provide mental health or counselling services, food, and other supplies.
- 8. Create an emergency contact list of family, friends, neighbours, healthcare providers, teachers, employers, the local public health department, and other community resources.
- 9. Learn about the emergency operations plan at your child's school or childcare facility, and your employer's emergency operations plan.
- 10. Practice everyday preventive actions including regular hand washing.

### **BDBC** Waste collection services

News release 9666, published on 21 Mar 2020

Basingstoke and Deane and Hart have suspended garden waste and bulky waste collections. Contractors Serco are facing and anticipating staffing shortages and are 'working hard to complete the 156,000 bin collections a week across Basingstoke and Deane and Hart with a reducing workforce'.

No new garden waste subscriptions or renewals will be accepted until the service is up and running again.

New bulky waste collection bookings in Basingstoke and Deane and Hart will be stopped until further notice, with the councils aiming to honour their existing bookings scheduled into April. Any changes or updates to the planned collections will be provided on the councils' websites and social media.


'Hampshire has a wealth of wildlife habitats, some of the most important protected by national or international designations such as Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSIs).

'But many other sites are also important for wildlife. Many contain habitats or features that cannot be recreated. It is important to ensure that they are not lost and that they continue to be managed for their wildlife interest.

'To help safeguard these sites for the future, they are identified and recorded as Sites of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINCs).

'SINCs rely upon continued stewardship by landowners and managers. Together with designated sites such as SSSIs, SINCs form a vital component of the biodiversity of Hampshire.'

Newnham Green, as map above, is a designated SINC (all shaded areas). The Parish Council is looking to achieve a maintenance programme which is comptable with its SINC and its Village Green status, with mown paths and an area for games.

The Management Proposal drawn up by Marion Stainton in 2005 in association with Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre (HBIC) was at the time thought to be too labour intensive to be practical. It has been neglected to date, but as an example of good practice can be well used to help inform a plan in sofaras practicable.

### Proposal for the management of Newnham Green

Marion Stainton and the Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre 2005

### **BRIEF BACKGROUND**

Two surveys were undertaken in 2005; one by botanist Ian Ralphs from the Hampshire Biodiversity Information Centre and one by John Buckley of the Amphibians Society.

Plant species growing on the Green support its unimproved grassland designation.

The two main ponds on the Green were found to contain breeding populations of all three species of newt resident in the UK and a particularly healthy population of Great Crested Newts.

Unfortunately the pond nearest Newnham Green Farm was also found to contain Crassula helmsii, an invasive weed which if left would take over the pond and create such a blanket over the surface that little pond life would remain.

Ongoing efforts to remove the weed will be needed.

Proposals have been drawn up for the management of the Green and the pond(s), as these are linked.

### VILLAGE GREEN

The main areas of focus are the central and largest part of the Green and the area around the pond in front of Newnham Green Farm.

**March** - Year 1 only (or if not this year then the following year)

#### **Chain harrow both areas**

<u>Purpose</u> Removal of large amount of thatch build-up from previous years to release the seed bank and increase the diversity of species.

### April - ongoing

Mowing recreation area and paths across and around the Green – if possible every two to three weeks. Ideally the mowings should be removed.

<u>Purpose</u> To provide an area for social activity on the Green. More regular mowing will make it a pleasanter place for children to play and the surrounding long grass will help keep children and balls off the roads.

### July - Fete years only

### Mow and remove mowings from a larger area of the Green.

As large an area as is practical should be kept long to maintain seed release. The area either side of the ponds should remain long to provide habitat and safety for amphibians entering and leaving ponds.

#### August

Late in the month, organise a group to go round the long grass areas of the green removing seed still on plants and scattering it.

<u>Purpose</u> Unless it is practical for the mowings to be left to dry on the green for 1 – 2 weeks, this method (recommended by Ian Ralphs) at least improves the seed release.

### September - ongoing

### Mow and remove all long grass

<u>Purpose</u> This will provide seed rich stubble important to some birds and the removal of grass will also reduce the fertility of the area, which in the long run (three to five years) should produce an increasingly attractive meadow effect on the Green.

NOTE Regular surveying will be needed in the early years to identify the best time for this major mow. Depending on the species mix in may be better to mow earlier. Hampshire and IOW Wildlife Trust to assist.

### November - ongoing

Mow and remove all long grass Stop mowing recreation areas and paths

<u>Purpose</u> This will leave the area tidier for the winter period and ready for next spring's new growth.

Dear residents,

We have had several crimes reported during the past month, most at the Fosters Business Park in Newnham along with a non-dwelling burglary at a farm just outside Newnham.

None of these crimes will effect general residents within the area, however please be mindful that during these interesting times the criminals will take full advantage if they can and such national emergencies will bring out both the very best and sadly worst of human behaviour, however I ask residents not to be worried about becoming a victim of crime, reported crime is low and with vigilance the chances of becoming a victim are even less likely especially in relation to fraud scams.

Cyber criminals are exploiting people's interest in COVID-19 to spread Ransomware by locking people out of their accounts or stealing information unless a ransom is paid. Ransomware is a type of malware that prevents you from accessing your computer (or the data that is stored on it). The computer itself may become locked, or the data on it might be stolen, deleted or encrypted.

Kindly read and follow the current advice from the National Cyber Security Centre to avoid becoming a victim of Ransomware.

There has been increased warning over the rise of fraud scams exploiting the coronavirus outbreak as UK losses near £1m. There have been warnings over emails claiming to be from World Health Organisation and other official bodies with many people reporting scams which have seen people pay for protective equipment that never arrived, as fraudsters use the global pandemic to target members of the public. The National Fraud Intelligence Bureau said reports related to the outbreak have rocketed 400 per cent in recent weeks.

The majority of reports were of online shopping scams where people ordered protective face masks, hand sanitiser, and other products that have never arrived. Action Fraud, which has a reporting hotline, has received more than 200 reports of coronavirus-themed phishing emails, which trick recipients into opening malicious attachments allowing the theft of their personal information or financial details. Some of the emails claim to be from a research group that mimicking the World Health Organisation (WHO) or US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). They claim to provide the victim with a list of active infections in their area if they click on a link to a credential-stealing page, or make a bitcoin donation.

Others offering fake medical support and targeting people who may be vulnerable or increasingly isolated at home. Fraudsters try to lure you in with offers that look too good to be true, such as high return investments and 'healthcare opportunities', or appeals for you to support those who are ill or bogus charities, the advice is simple, think very carefully before you hand over your money, and don't give out your personal details unless you are sure who you are dealing with. Other fraudsters are tricking people into clicking on a malicious link to a newsletter with coronavirus updates, sending investment and trading advice on how to take financial advantage of the economic downturn or directing people to a fake HMRC website offering tax refunds.

If you think you have been a victim please report to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. I would also recommend a visit to the Action Fraud website which has some really useful anti-fraud information.

The Metropolitan Police in London are also reporting that thieves are offering to shop for the elderly and then stealing their money and not returning with the goods. Also that burglars have been 'posing as NHS workers carrying out coronavirus testing for the illness in order to gain entry in to homes.

Please do not worry, just be vigilant and if you need any advice please call.

I once met Arnold Schwarzenegger at a film premier. It was at the height of his fame when Terminator 2 was released. He was eating a chocolate egg at the after party and I asked him a question. I said "Arnold, what's your favourite Christian Festival?" He replied "you have to love Easter, baby"

I'm sorry. I tried so hard not to. If the joke doesn't make sense you'll have to watch Terminator 2.

But it's an interesting question. What is your favourite Christian Festival?

I guess many would say Christmas. It's the ultimate feel good Festival, full of hope and joy, and for most a time of family and friends. But maybe you like Harvest too? There's something reassuringly earthy and solid about it. It helps us to connect with creation and encourages us to be thankful while reminding us that God is the one who provides. What about Mothering Sunday? Perfect if you've forgotten to buy mum a gift because daffodils are given out free at church...

Easter is more tricky though isn't it? Sure there's the easy and more palatable bits of tradition that have grown up around it, but ultimately Easter is quite difficult. After-all In the run up to Easter we have Lent. A time for some serious self reflection and a time in which Christians have traditionally sought to take to heart our own brokenness and sinfulness and our need of salvation. Then we get to Holy Week and ultimately the sorrow of Maundy Thursday and the horror of Good Friday when we recall Christ's betrayal, crucifixion and death. It's only after this that we come to Easter day itself when the darkness lifts and the church celebrates the victory of Christ over sin and death.

It's always tempting to skip the tricky stuff and go straight to the easy and happy bits. But for Easter to make sense we have to go through it all. Through Lent in which we acknowledge our need of forgiveness and salvation, through Holy Week when we are prepared to face the cost of securing forgiveness and salvation, through Good Friday when we see in the starkest possible terms the lengths to which God was prepared to go to win us back.

Then and only then can we see Easter Day for what it really is. The central Festival of the Christian year. The high point in Gods plan of salvation. The moment in which sin and death were defeated and new life was proclaimed and offered by the one who was raised. Truly worth celebrating.

Easter is almost here, and most of us will be looking forward to eating eggs (of the chocolate variety!) on Easter day. Not so in Dunstable, just North of London, where they will be grabbing their oranges and going to nearby Dunstable Hills! There they all stand in a line and roll them down a hill... This tradition helps them remember the story of Easter. The orange reminds them of the stone that sealed Jesus' tomb when He was buried. When they roll it down the hill, it represents when the stone was rolled away on Easter morning, the grave was empty and Jesus was not there. The sadness the disciples had felt on Good Friday, when Jesus had died on the cross, had miraculously changed to the joy of Easter Sunday, when He had risen from the dead.

The Dunstable oranges got me thinking... Who remembers Christingles? We make them at Christmas each year to remind us of Jesus coming into our world as a baby. So, I got to wondering if we could make Easter Christingles to remember Him dying and rising back again. Let's give it a go!

- Find an orange this represents the stone which was rolled away on Easter morning.
- Inside the top of the apple, wrapped up in foil at the base, is a white candle. It represents the light of Christ, white and pure, come into the world (just like at Christmas).
- Four pieces of garden dowelling are tied together to make two crosses, either side of the candle, representing the two thieves.
- Cocktail sticks, stuck around the top of the apple, represent the crown of thorns.
- Three pieces of wool are plaited together, red for blood, black for death, purple
  for Jesus' robe. They are fixed around the apple, with a drawing pin, representing
  the nails.
