- **3 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING** 21st January agreed and signed.

.1 New applications for consideration

- <u>T/00125/22/TRQ2</u> BDBC has acknowledge receipt of the TPO (Tree Preservation Order) request from the Mapledurwell Parish Tree Warden for trees on Tunworth Road (South).
- TO RECORD Appreciation to Tree Warden John Maclean for his prompt action in preparing a TPO request for the treeline on Tunworth Road (south). <u>22/00676/FUL</u> (Validated 03 Mar 2022) High Field View, Frog Lane. Erection of a new

bungalow to replace the concrete garage currently located at the north end of the land.

- NOTED No significant objections received from immediate neighbours.
- AGREED 'The Parish Council has no objection in principle to the replacement of the concrete garage with a small two bedroomed dwelling at this location – with conditions. The impact of the development on landscape and locality can be considered acceptable if the hard fencing be replaced with substantial native hedging, plus a landscaping scheme as a matter of condition. Appropriate soft landscaping could achieve an overall improvement.'

<u>22/00635/ADV</u> (Validated 25 Feb 2022) The Hatch. Display of 1 no. externally illuminated totem sign, 1 no. illuminated painted individual letter building sign, 2 no. non-illuminated double sided post signs, 1 no. non-illuminated single sided post sign, and I no. illuminated single sided post sign. *Parish Council – no objection*

<u>22/00630/FUL</u> and <u>22/00678/LBC</u> (Validated 25 Feb 2022) The Hatch. Minor internal and external alterations, redecoration and repairs to building; new signage; erection of 2 no. pergola, including fixed seating and external fire; erection of external bar servery; partial resurfacing of car park and installation of new gates; replace existing bridge; repaving, new bollard lights and arbors; demolition of existing garden sheds / structures and erection of new shed; new island patios with festoon lighting to garden; new fencing and associated works.

AGREED The Parish Council is supportive of the pub and in principle supportive of measures to support the pub business. It has concerns about the additional lighting, considering light pollution to the area in general, particulary any adverse impact on neighbours. Noted it is already a large pub with a lot of outside space and busy in summer. Also considering the nature of the area which is already affected by the busy road, and built up – increasing by the Riverview apartments development. It is important that any changes should be to improve the character and appearance of the area and in particular the setting of the Grade II listed pub. Also preference to retain the wooden bridge.

<u>22/00212/TDC</u> (Validated 17 Feb 2022) Nunnery House, Tunworth Road. Application for Technical Details Consent for conversion of an agricultural building to 1 no. dwelling and new vehicular access from Tunworth Road in accordance with Permission in Principle 20/00009/PIP [Allowed at Appeal].

The Parish Council initially responded with a request for clarity regarding the access proposals. On discussion with the case officer, she confirmed that the DTC application includes a new access to the South.

For signature (p1 of 4)

AGREED the Parish Council is strongly opposed on the grounds of adverse impact on the street scene – presently a narrow tree-lined rural road – and so on the nature of the Conservation Area. The harm would be unacceptable – the destruction of an old and established tree and hedge-lined banking by opening through a driveway onto a domestic property, now oriented to face the road, with accompanying light and vehicle pollution adversely impacting the locality and neighbouring properties, not least as the new dwelling is in an elevated position several metres above. The application's own heritage statement argues against these various impacts on the Conservation Area. The PIP application indicated the house to be aligned away from the road and from neighbours with all screening retained. The Parish Council also takes issue with the excessive parking provision suggesting preparation for further housing development by means of this access. The application fails to include any detail on sightlines and road safety.

.2 Local Plan Update – Housing Numbers

6 FROG LANE

- **Allotment Update** The Allotment Apiary agreement has been signed as agreed. Confirmed all allotments taken for the year. Re the new bird boxes, reportedly 'a blue tit, has commandeered Box No 1 (on the tree by the allotment footpath)'.
- .2 Watercress Beds Lease supplied by Bates solicitor (acting for the Parish Council) for signing, required to be signed in presence of an solicitor.

AGREED Colin Robertson to sign on behalf of the Parish Council.

.3 Verges Agreed area by allotment gate (north) now achieved best result possible – by modifying the works done to shore up the road edge and removing the posts. Thank to Colin Robertson for his hard work. Noted that vehicles have driven over the verge next to the allotment gate but the culvert has remained protected.

8 VILLAGE HALL GROUNDS

.1 Playground maintenance

Kevin Rafferty reported works in progress following the November RoSPA Inspection recommendations. All moss removed plus modifications to the gate. Awaiting the cross cutting on the balance beam, plus top-up bark to be added as soon as the weather dries. The routine RoSPA survey 2022 (Hants region) will take place in May, no date given.

- **.2 Tennis** Chairman reported that the new net posts installed. Also a reminder notice to users to please sweep the courts a new brush has been supplied. Note to be included in the *Villager*, plus inviting more villagers to make use of the courts.

- .4 **Football pitch** A further request received from Old Basing Rovers to use the pitch.

AGREED Clerk to respond for the Parish Council that the pitch is leased to Chineham Tigers on a 10year contract which includes an agreement for grant-funded ground improvement. (Noted that Old Basing Rovers do have use of all the Old Basing pitches.) <u>Spare goal posts by the hall</u> – are still there. Clerk to again request CT to move them to the other end of the pitch by the car park as will soon be in the way of grass cutting.

11 FURTHER UPDATES / REPORTS

.1 Village Hall – Energy Efficiency HCC P&TC Investment Fund

The VH Committee has secured funding for an Energy Efficiency Audit and Recommended Renewables Report (Parish & Town Council Investment Fund).

Village Hall Committee identified NFU Energy as a 'good and well respected company (part of the NFU group) to deliver an Energy Efficiency Audit for the village hall'. From NFU Energy – 'The plan would be for an engineer to perform an on-site visit, report and advise on the feasibility of renewables generation, likely solar PV and GSHP. We will investigate what size system(s) would be best suited to your electricity use & profile, and provide some basic feedback on costs, ROI and considerations.'

.2 HCC – Greywell Road pavement – HCC-owned boundary hedge

NOTED HCC have cut back the trees and hedge, not the 'undergrowth' – grass and brambles. It will likely be cut with the HCC verge cutting programme but no information as to when. AGREED Schedule the Parish Lengthsman to cut twice a year.

.3 Police Update

i <u>Police Community Meeting 'Barn Meet'</u> of 3rd February held in Rotherwick Village Hall, c14 police attended, c50 guests. Speakers included Horse Watch, Equine Liaison, Crown

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Prosecution Service, Chief Inspector. Main message is that all local policing is intelligence led, reporting of any suspicious incident – including details, number plates, photos – from the public is vital in building an evidence base for targeted policing and for prosection.

Case Officer report noted that: 'The proposed bike store is to be relocated and be accessible by a pathway from the front parking area on either side of the building containing the flats. The proposal would not result in a loss of bike storage and would actually be increased from 55 to 60 spaces. The proposal is therefore in accordance with Local Plan Policies EM10 and CN9 and is acceptable in this regard.

I am sending this on behalf of Cllr Tracy Woodruff who is the chairman and Mayor of Whitchurch Town Council and is also chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Review Group.

The NPRG has been up and running for almost a year in preparation for the upcoming Local Plan Update and we are increasingly concerned, as I know many of you are, about the numbers of houses/dwellings that are being proposed for the Borough and for each of our parishes. I don't believe any of us have the infrastructure to accommodate the numbers being suggested, which could well increase, or are our local physical and environmental constraints being taken into consideration, other than Tadley.

At the last few EPH Committee meetings these high numbers have been raised by concerned speakers and the way in which they have been calculated using the standard methodology. At the meeting on Thursday 3rd March an alternative way to calculate a number for the Borough, using the Chelmer Population and Housing Model was presented, using up to date 2021 census data, and not out of date 2009 figures.

The Committee are being encouraged to look at exceptional circumstances as an argument to lower the numbers, however this has never been successful. Therefore we must find an alternative model before it's too late.

One of our subject matter experts is a Fellow of the Royal Town Planning Institute, who would be happy to share his knowledge and the Whitchurch Strategy for a credible way forward in challenging the current standard methodology. We would also be interested in hearing your frustrations with the process and any ideas you may have in progressing this matter further.

I believe we have to reduce the overall number for the borough if we want to be successful in reducing the numbers in our parishes. Working together and being one voice will increase our chances of success.

Please can you let me know whether you would be interested in joining us to discover more either on line or in person.



'Many of us have heard stories about 4x4s 'off-roading' and a lot of councils, perhaps including yourselves, have recently been contacted by a campaign regarding vehicles driving on byways and unsurfaced roads. This can be a contentious subject and certain groups have been known to paint a negative and untrue picture around the topic. Of course bad news travels fast and groups leverage that tendency in a classic tabloid fashion.

'The reality is that driving and riding lanes is a positive, valuable, legal and life enhancing activity. It is loved and enjoyed across the nation by those thousands who you will most likely never see nor hear as they quietly and politely exercise their rights.

Here at the Green Lane Association (GLASS), the UK user group supporting the rights of all users to access byways and unsurfaced roads, we thought it would be useful to show you the balanced, factual reality behind the stories you may have heard.

It's a slightly complicated issue as the truth behind any headline often is, but we'll try and be brief!

'It's not off-roading – you can't 'off-road' on a road, which is what a byway is. Off-roading is driving other than a road either with or without permission. Like you, we HATE it when 4x4s or bikes go into fields or forests where they should not, often doing damage. They should be enforced against by the authorities. This is not 'Green Laning', as the driving of byways is often called, but trespass and criminal damage and it needs action. Shutting lanes won't stop these criminals.

'Green-Laners are normal, civil people who love the countryside. Many have horses and also walk or ride. A surprising number have disabilities and use their vehicles to enjoy the countryside in a way that would be impossible for them otherwise. We have over 5800 wonderful members and they tell us their stories. You can watch some of them here: Glass Videos

'Green-Laning supports a vast industry that benefits our regions. Food, accommodation and fuel is bought locally. Vehicles parts and servicing is undertaken by a myriad of garages. The wellbeing of thousands of drivers and passengers is hugely enhanced, especially in the area of mental health and stress relief which is in itself a cost saving to the nation. Green-Laners help maintain and tidy routes that would otherwise quickly become overgrown and impassable – and there are numerous example of this on the Glass website

'GLASS and its members advise and partner with councils and authorities across the UK and work to deal with hotspots, educating both drivers and the public and ensure that everyone gets the best from our precious and ancient network of rights of way. Members subscriptions are used to waymark and maintain lanes for everyone's benefit. Other organisations do the same for trail bike riding. These are not some fly-by-night network of the ill-advised but career professionals working at the highest levels to ensure countryside access for all.

'We have attached a open letter regarding some of the recent untruths that have been put about by negative pressure groups who only work to remove and not enhance access. We invite you to reject that negativism and help build a network fit for all legal classes of user, for everyone's mutual benefit.
