#### POLICE SEEK TO MAKE REPORTING EASIER

Hampshire Constabulary is pleased to be able to share a new QR code for members of the local community to report crimes, information and anti-social behaviour.

Scan the QR code using your smartphone camera and select one of three options: 1. Report a crime; 2. Something you've seen or heard or, 3. Report anti-social behaviour. You can still report an incident via the website link, calling 101 (or 999 if it is an emergency). 'Hampshire Constabulary

# LOCAL GREEN SPACE A NEW REPORT FROM CPRE

The Local Green Space Policy was introduced in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) of 2012, after CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England) campaigned for more powers for local people, and protection for green spaces with 'intrinsic character'.

The policy enables communities to apply for Local Green Space designations which afford the same level of protection as Green Belt or National Park status. Green Spaces valued on account of 'a particular local significance' are deemed suitable, as long as they are close to where people live and not 'extensive tracts of land'.

# The Local Green Space designation is unique in protecting land according to its importance to the community.

CPRE has conducted the first study of how and where Local Green Spaces have been created and the impact of the designations.

A total of 6,515 Local Green Spaces have been designated in the decade since their introduction (83% via Neighbourhood Plans). Combined, they total 30,000 acres. The majority of these spaces are not open countryside, but the small, undeveloped patches that provide millions of appreciative people with a daily dose of nature.

However the analysis shows that there is scope for greater take-up. CPRE is calling on Government and local authorities to step up their support for Local Green Spaces and really promote this policy – which could also be a valuable tool for engaging people with the wider planning system.

Over 80% of Local Green Spaces have been designated in part for their recreational value – highlighting their importance for people seeking outdoor exercise so vital to health and wellbeing. The richness of their wildlife was a factor in over a third of designations, suggesting that Local Green Spaces can play a major role in reviving the UK's biodiversity.

CPRE chief executive Crispin Truman argues for every neighbourhood to have a protected place for community wellbeing:

'It should be a national priority to protect our local green spaces so that everybody, no matter where they live, has access to the benefits of nature.' The CPRE report argues that broadening the use of the Local Green Space designation should be seen as a critical part of the government's levelling up agenda and also argues for expanding the criteria for designating a Local Green Space:

'It should be made much clearer that the examples of "local significance" cited in the NPPF – relating to beauty, tranquility, wildlife, history or recreation – do not constitute either a binding or an exhaustive list... local people are best placed to decide what is important to their area.

'Furthermore, with climate-conscious communities increasingly mindful of the role green space can play in reducing flooding (such as Peacock Meadow in Plympton, Devon, and the Lea Brook Valley in Dronfield, Derbyshire), the NPPF must specify that climate adaptation and mitigation can be a reason for designation.' <a href="https://www.cpre.org.uk/news/">https://www.cpre.org.uk/news/</a>

#### NOTES FROM THE JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

**Parish precept** request to BDBC of £10,325 agreed for 2022/23.

**Allotments** are now all taken for the coming year. Good luck and welcome to existing and new tenants.

**Allotment apiary** proposal supported by neighbours, allotmenteers and PC.

**Bird boxes** Thanks to Tree Warden for organising new bird boxes – for allotments and Village Hall grounds.

**Frog Lane chalk stream** The draft lease for the former Watercress Beds is being reviewed by solicitor.

**Frog Lane Verges** Agreed for repair work to bolster the roadside north of the allotment gateway, to help protect the area opposite the gate where tree roots are overrun and the road is breaking away.

**Tennis courts** Courts cleaned, new net posts delivered, nets to be fitted.

**Jubilee Tree** A London Plane tree is on order – as requested by the Tree Warden and supported by the Friends of St Mary's. Location for tree agreed (between the football net and the tennis courts). Agreed to purchase wrought iron tree guard and plague.

**Maintenance contract** renewal confirmed for 2022.

**Mapledurwell pond** In hand to replace fence posts and rail, plus replace bridge / ditch crossing point with new sleepers and mesh.

**Five Lanes End** Tree protection rails. Agreed to obtain quotes and discuss with Friends of St Mary's re replacing the post and rail originally erected to protect the Beech trees.

#### FROM THE PARISH TREE WARDEN

In World War II, Fleet Pond provided an excellent navigational reference for German Bombers targeting the Royal Aircraft Establishment at Farnborough. The answer to camouflaging was Willow as it takes only a few short months to root and come into leaf. So if you spot a stick under one of the recently pollarded willows, pick it up, put it into a flower pot with lots of damp soil and watch your new tree flourish this summer!



To mark the Platinum Jubilee, a 14-foot London Plane Tree has been planted at the western end of the recreation ground near the Diamond Jubilee orchard. It will feature properly in our village celebration of the occasion in June when it will be adorned by a wrought iron guard and a commemorative plaque.

There are a number trees that have survived their first year in the allotment tree nursery. They are still vulnerable to anything that is minded to eat them, but I am being sent some more plastic guards. Together with added varieties provided gratis by The Conservation Volunteers, there are enough whips for a small woodland or individual planting to enhance the vista along the sightline of a footpath, road or track. As there doesn't seem to be much scope for this on council land, bids to plant them in the public interest elsewhere would be welcome. The selection includes English Oak, Silver and Downy Birches, Aspens, Beech and Hornbeam, Alder, a few Rowan and Goat Willows.

The winner of the competition on the numbered nest boxes on 15 of the trees in our public spaces is Diana Davidson. She achieved full marks for her answers especially for her ingenuity given that some of the box numbers had been washed off! Her prize is yet another nest box to add to the ones already in her garden.

A blue tit, has commandeered Box No 1 (on the tree by the allotment footpath) for its family springtime residence. Have any of our twitchers discovered others already in use? John K C Maclean, Tree Warden, Up Nately & Mapledurwell

#### POLICE UPDATE FROM PCSO ANDY JONES

Officers are investigating a number of reports of thefts from motor vehicles and have arrested a man.

Between Wednesdays 26 January and 2 February, a number of vehicles were broken into in areas between Burghclere and Beacon Hill. Various items including number plates, Apple Airpods, handbags and clothing were stolen.

On Saturday, 5 February, officers arrested a 47-year-old man from Havant on suspicion of the following offences:

He has been questioned by officers and released under investigation while enquiries continue.

#### THE HIGHWAY CODE: EIGHT CHANGES YOU NEED TO KNOW FROM 29TH JANUARY 2022

Rules for all types of road users have been updated in The Highway Code to improve the safety of people walking, cycling and riding horses.

#### 1. Hierarchy of road users

**2. People crossing at junctions** 'When people are crossing or waiting to cross the road at a junction, other traffic should give way.'

# 3. Walking, cycling or riding in shared spaces

#### **4.** Cyclist positioning in the road

'To ride in the centre of their lane on quiet roads, in slower-moving traffic and at the approach to junctions or road narrowings • keeping at least 0.5 metres away from the kerb edge when riding on busy roads with vehicles moving faster than they are • Cyclists are asked to be aware of people driving behind them and allow them to overtake when it's safe to do so.'

#### 5. Overtaking

'You may cross a double-white line (if the road is clear) to overtake someone cycling or riding a horse if they are travelling at 10mph or less • People cycling may pass slower-moving or stationary traffic on their right or left.'

#### 6. Cyclists at junctions

'When turning into or out of a side road, cyclists should give way to people crossing or waiting to cross.'

#### 7. Roundabouts

'Drivers and motorcyclists should give priority to cyclists on roundabouts.'

#### 8. Parking, charging, leaving vehicles

'Ten sections of The Highway Code have been updated, with 50 rules being added or updated. You can find a summary of all the changes in The Highway Code updates list on GOV.UK.

'You can – read the full updated version free of charge on GOV.UK; download The Highway Code iOS app ( $\pm$ 3.49) which will be updated with all the changes in Spring 2022 (an Android version is being developed); pre-order an updated hard copy online ( $\pm$ 4.99), or buy at most high street bookshops from April 2022; plus sign up to get email alerts when the rules change.'



#### **DEADLINE REMOVED FOR RECORDING RIGHT OF WAY**

Using historical evidence, it is possible to apply for long established paths which are not official 'Rights of Way' - to be added to the 'definitive maps', giving them legal protection.


The Countryside and Rights of Way Act contained a provision that any pre-1949 paths must be recorded by 2026 in order to be legally recognised.

Government has removed the 2026 deadline, a move welcomed by the Open Space Society and the Ramblers which says it has identified 41,000 miles of missing 'Rights of Way' to be investigated and applied for in England as part of its 'Don't Lose Your Way' campaign. The Welsh government had previously repealed the cut-off date.

However DEFRA is also saying theat 'The Government will to take forward a package of measures in order to help enhance the way that rights of way are recorded and managed.

'As well as repealing the 2026 cut-off the Government plans to introduce a "right to apply" for landowners to divert or extinguish rights of way in certain circumstances."

The Open Spaces Society has said it is concerned about the right to apply and will be lobbying against it.

### POLICING Past

This is one remaining story taken over from Andv's article of last

month which then wouldn't quite fit in... and refers to the time when Hook – and the Crooked Billet – was part of Newnham Parish.

#### Dear Residents

Please find below further example of life within your community of the past. At the Basingstoke Divisional Petty Sessions, William Champion and his wife Rebecca, landlord and landlady of the 'Crooked Billet', Newnham, were both charged with being drunk on their own licensed premises on November 9th 1900. They were convicted and fined 10s (£39.09 in 2017 equivalent) each, including costs. Mr. Roper, on behalf of Messrs May and Co, the Brewery, informed the Bench that though the license of this house had been in defendant's family for towards 50 years, they had now received a month's notice to leave.

## HIGHWAYMEN IN AND AROUND BASINGSTOKE

Back in the 18thC the area around Basingstoke provided rich pickings for highwaymen. Basingstoke was an important staging point on the Western



Post Road as well as being a significant market town – where it was possible to see who was likely to be leaving the town with money. The town was surrounded by copses and woods from which to spring an ambush, and steep hills that coaches and horses could only climb at walking pace.

Sometime in late 1724, three highway robbers visited Basingstoke market. They saw which farmers were making most money and found out where their farms were. Having decided where their best returns would be, they left the market towards nightfall and hid themselves in a wood by a narrow lane near Ellisfield (possibly at White Hill just south of Ellisfield) to lie in wait for the farmers to return home. There they robbed several farmers and tied them up to prevent them warning others.

One of the robbers told the farmers they were waiting to rob 'the fat farmer with the grey horse'. One of the farmers replied that he would not be easily robbed. So when the fat farmer came into view, instead of telling him to 'stand and deliver', they fired at him without warning. Despite apparently being a large target, they narrowly missed him and he got away. The three robbers were brothers George and Richard Cutler – who also used the surname Miller – and John Winter. They were responsible for a number of highway robberies in the south of the county. One report said that the Cutlers 'belong'd to a Gang that had been guilty of several Murders'. 'They had lived by the Highway many Years.'

Before the main road to London was diverted across Hook Common in the 1780s, it passed through Newnham. The steep slope of Crown Lane made it an ideal spot for highwaymen to ambush their victims. Early in the morning of 17 October 1728, three highwaymen, two with long guns and one with a long stick, robbed several coaches coming from the west at Newnham Hill. They took £8 14s from the passengers in the Exeter Coach. In November 1747 a 'well-mounted highwayman' robbed a draper of four guineas 'on the Hills between Basingstoke and Newnham' as he was returning to London from Andover, and two highwaymen robbed a Quaker on Newnham Hill in November 1750. It is not known how many other robberies took place on that spot that were never reported in the newspapers.



Deserts are really fascinating places...

I'm sure you've all heard of the Sahara desert and maybe even the Gobi desert, but did you know, for example, that the largest desert in the world is actually in Antarctica? Plenty of water – in the ice – but hardly any snow or rain each year.

The Aralkum Desert is known as the youngest desert of our planet. This desert in Asia was formed by the former eastern basin of the Aral Sea in Uzbekistan. It formed in the 1960s when irrigation projects for the huge cotton plantations in the area drained the waters from the Aral lake. Yes, those are boats you can see in the picture!

The hottest desert in the world is, of course, the Sahara. It's huge and gets to temperatures of 50°C. Sadly, it has grown more than 10% in the last century due to climate change and other natural climatic variations. Billions of trees are being planted each year to try to combat this desertification – this is called a green wall.

Why am I talking so much about desserts? Well a time called Lent starts on 2nd March (the day after Pancake Day) and it's a time when we get ready for Easter by remembering Jesus' 40 days in the desert. He gave up food and drink and spent the time thinking and praying about what God wanted him to do in his life. This is why some people give up things they really enjoy, like chocolate or sweets, so they can imagine what it must have felt like. This was the very start of the time Jesus spent teaching and healing – which is the part of his life we hear about in the Bible.

At the end of this 40 days, Jesus was tempted. Watch this video to find out more about that story! Have you ever been tempted to do the wrong thing? To take something which isn't yours, or say something which isn't true? Sometimes it takes



real strength and courage to do the right thing, when it would be so much easier to do the wrong thing.

Whenever I'm tempted and not sure what to do, I always ask myself: 'What Would Jesus Do?' Sometimes that helps me to make the right decision. Some people even make a bracelet or bookmark to help them remember to do this. Can you design a bookmark to help you remember how to make good decisions? The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) is holding a secondary consultation from 22 February to 4 April on its proposals for new parliamentary constituencies as part of the 2023 Boundary Review.

BCE is required by Parliament to undertake an independent and impartial review of all constituencies in England, to rebalance the number of electors in each constituency.

Residents and communities can respond to the consultation in writing or speaking at a public hearing and local councils are encouraged to have their say on the proposals.

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
